- Write in the present tense.
- Use an imperative (bossy) verb for each instruction, telling the reader what to do: for example *Put/Make/Clear/*etc.
- Include diagrams or images to instruct the reader (with labels if needed).
- Describe what the finished product should look like.
- Use time connection words like First/Next/Then/Finally this does not have to be for every step!
- Use adverbs to describe how something should be done, e.g. carefully/slowly/quickly
